



Collect of the Day

Amos 5:18-24

Reader: A Reading from the book of Amos

Alas for you who desire the day of the Lord! Why do you want the day of the Lord? It is darkness, not light; as if someone fled from a lion, and was met by a bear; or went into the house and rested a hand against the wall, and was bitten by a snake. Is not the day of the Lord darkness, not light, and gloom with no brightness in it? I hate, I despise your festivals, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them; and the offerings of well-being of your fatted animals I will not look upon. Take away from me the noise of your songs; I will not listen to the melody of your harps. But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

Happy shall he be who takes your little ones, * and dashes them against the rock!


Galatians 3:23-29

Affirmation of Faith

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,

and his kingdom will have no end.

We trust in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We trust in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come.







What is Juneteenth?

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation, but during the Civil War southern states did not honor it. Not until Union troops led by General Gordon Granger ordered its final enforcement in Galveston, Texas, did slavery finally end in Texas, the last Confederate state in the country.

It should be noted that the Emancipation Proclamation applied only to the Confederate states. Enslaved peoples in Union states remains enslaved until the ratification of the 13the Amendment on December 6, 1865.

The original Juneteenth was marked by celebrations in African American churches as early as 1866.

Juneteenth was recognized by the US Congress in 2021 as a national holiday.

Since creation of the national holiday, other churches have begun celebrating the day. The Bible is full of stories of God's liberation: the people of Israel freed from bondage in Egypt, their enslaved captivity in Babylon, the freedom messages of the prophets, Jesus' proclamation that he has come to proclaim release to the captives (Lk 4:16-19), and St. Paul's letter insisting that in Christian communities "there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female...." (Gal 3:28) In 2020, the Episcopal Diocese of California approved a resolution in diocesan convention making Juneteenth an official church feast day in the diocese.
