Naomi her mother-in-law said to Ruth, "My daughter, I need to seek some security for you, so that it may be well with you. Now here is our kinsman Boaz, with whose young women you have been working. See, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing floor. Now wash and anoint yourself, and put on your best clothes and go down to the threshing floor; but do not make yourself known to the man until he has finished eating and drinking. When he lies down, observe the place where he lies; then, go and uncover his feet and lie down; and he will tell you what to do." She said to her, "All that you tell me I will do."

Next Wednesday, November 20, at 7pm we will mark the **Transgender Day of Remembrance** here at St. Ben's. This will be a simple candlelit vigil in the church, we will pray for those people whose lives have been cut short over the last year as a result of violence against the transgender community, we will pray for an end to hate of all kinds and we will pray for an end to violences of all kinds. The transgender community in this country is very small, less than 1%, yet it receives a great deal of negative attention, most recently in the form of campaign ads in the run up to the presidential election. Anti-trans rhetoric in our mainstream culture has a real-life impact on the real lives lived by transgender and non-binary people in our community, and we here at St. Benedict's can be an ever-increasing counter-force for love in Los Osos and across our region. Please join me, next Wednesday, and together we can grieve the ongoing impact of hate and violence in our society, and, *together*, we will acknowledge that love does and will heal, and that love does and will always have the power to transform our world - all are invited, all are welcome. (This service will be in-person only).
